1. Can provide safe and affordable housing for herself and her family.

3. Has safe and reliable transportation with the ability to maintain that transportation.
4. Has safe and dependable child care when needed.
5. Has a healthy support network.
6. Has the necessary life-skills to maintain job and personal responsibilities.
7. Has sustained employment with benefits for at least six months.
